Back to School as Little Olive Tree!

The first day of school this year was especially exciting, with us starting the year with a new, refreshed brand – Little Olive Tree (LOT). As our 11 Presbyterian Preschools were rebranded as Little Olive Tree Preschools with effect from 1 January 2024, we now have a total of 16 LOT Preschools islandwide!

To kick off the new school year, we gifted an LOT school bag to each of our children as part of the 'My Little Bag of Dreams' initiative. We hope that their Little Bags can be a stepping stone to their Big Goals of becoming independent and responsible individuals.



The LOT bags were carefully selected so that children can manage their bags without assistance, which boosts their self-esteem and gives them a sense of accomplishment. Through exploring the significance of a school bag, it promotes a sense of ownership of their belongings as well.

Being accountable for their own things, learning to pack the essentials and to keep things tidy instils a sense of responsibility that extends beyond just the backpack to other areas of their lives.

The teachers have been facilitating this fresh start and opportunity for the children to reinvent themselves by helping them to explore the contents in their school bags and understand the importance of taking care of their personal belongings.



We continue to encourage parents to partner us in cultivating a new culture at home, where children collaborate with parents to discuss what goes in their bag and children get to pack and unpack their own bags.

All in all, we want children to express their individuality and thoughts, for us to celebrate their small wins and to continue engaging parents as our partners.

The next time you see a little child carrying their school bag, remember that it's more than just a bag. It's a representation of their journey, their hopes, and their dreams. It's a backpack full of dreams and possibilities!

Teacher's Commencement Day: God is doing a New Thing

This year, we joined hands with New Life Preschool Services to hold a combined Commencement Service. It is our collective desire to see greater unity amongst the Christian Preschool Ministry in Singapore, where resources, expertise and the love for one another is made all the more evident in spite of our various heritage and denominations.

Together as partners in the Christian Preschool Ministry, we thanked God for 2023 and started the new year together.



Mr Lim Ee Tuo, our Executive Director shared a very real perspective of how collaboration usually works in the secular world: the parties involved usually have the objective of establishing a win-win partnership with mutual benefits.

However, as Christian organisations, he urged us to think deeper than that. "The Bible reminds us that when we come together, the priority is always to love each other first before anything else. We must have the willingness to give all that we have to those around us, sometimes at the expense of our own well-being.

Indeed, teachers are no strangers to the act of pouring so much of themselves into the children's lives," shared Mr Lim.



We had Reverend Doctor Chua Chung Kai, Associate Pastor of Covenant Evangelical Free Church share the message of the day based on Isaiah 43:19. Rev Dr. Chua posed everyone there a challenge: This year, will you pay attention and trust God?

Just as we greet our loved ones in the morning, he encouraged us to simply begin the day talking to God and reading his Word. This way, we can be more sensitive and aware to the new things that God is doing in our lives. During dry seasons, He makes a way for us in the wilderness when we cry out to Him.

The service ended off with our teachers and staff pledging and committing ourselves to the work of loving and nurturing the children and giving our best in the upcoming year, especially as our preschools begin the new year as Little Olive Tree.

Little Olive Tree Open Houses 2024!

Little Olive Tree welcomed both existing and potential parents to a series of Open Houses this year across several locations, with the intention to connect with the community, showcase our curriculum to parents, and provide an opportunity for teachers to speak to parents in a more personal and intimate setting.

Across all the schools, we conducted lesson experiences for parents to understand the day-to-day lessons on a deeper level. We also brought parents on school tours for them to explore the environment and learning spaces that children learn, play and interact in daily.

LOT Bukit Arang (BAR)

At BAR, they had an exploration trail, which encouraged families to intentionally visit stations all around the school, reflecting BAR's philosophy of learning through exploration.

The Wonder Room, which followed the theme of camping in the forest, was the most intriguing and popular. Children could engage in Dramatic Play, 'roasting' marshmallows over a 'fire', as well as entering a mystery cave - relying only on their hands to feel the texture of the items in the dark, dark, cave.

LOT Foochow Methodist Church Farrer Park (FMCFP)

Parents who visited FMCFP could choose to join one of 7 different rooms showcasing various activities and mock-up lessons, such as Key To Learning Construction and water play. They were also invited to a parent and child Tang Yuan-making session, where families got to make the dessert from scratch and taste it after that as well!



Parents were happy to see their children in thriving in their learning environment, with one parent even telling the principal this: "My child doesn't want to go home! I also wish that I am a child again so I can come to school." Some principals from the other LOTs also came by to help out and exchange learning pointers with the teachers in FMCFP. It was such a heartwarming sight to be able to see staff come together to support each other.

LOT Woodlands (WDL)

For WDL, they had an exciting carnival with lots of fun and games for parents and children to bond over, such as feed the monster and pass the ping pong ball!

We started off the day with worship, thanking God for his faithfulness and his new mercies for yet another day. Our Executive Director, Mr Lim Eetuo, then shared about why Play matters. Play enables us to grow and be grounded by our curiosity and childlikeness; outstanding achievements only happen when our hearts are fully in it, and when we are playful and curious.

And play we did. To appreciate the various talents of our staff and to promote the spirit of learning from one another, we had 3 sessions of workshops going on throughout the day, with every workshop being led by a staff.



At the kitchen and courtyard, participants whipped up a feast for the senses as delectable ingredients were transformed into interesting dishes with delightful aromas. We had staff from HQ doing live demonstrations on how to cook vegetables with the healthy 'water frying' method as well as how to make

'mua chee' and dumplings from scratch. "I saw teachers working hard to wrap the dumplings, including the younger and older ones. I really saw them living out the the '活到老学到老 (live until you are old, learn until you are old). shared Zhang Jinglin from LOT mantra," Hougang.

There were so many classes on art techniques using a diversity of mediums too, which was a testament to our colleagues' inspiring talents and abilities!





"I gained a new perspective that it's ok to be messy as it is part of art. A mistake or mess can turn into a beautiful masterpiece. The workshop was fun and light so it was a good break for the teachers," shared Tomas Princess Anne Gilo from LOT Holland Village.

Where Fire Destroys, **Love Restores**

On 15 January, a fire broke out at LOT Ang Mo Kio (AMK). Despite the initial feelings of shock, panic and loss, it was by God's grace that we were able to restore the school in just 3 weeks. From start to end, it was really a 'kampung' effort that helped us to overcome this adversity.



Firstly, it was a network of neighbours in AMK that allowed the news of the fire to reach us as soon as possible so that we could respond swiftly.

The following two days, all AMK teachers along with staff from HQ were mobilised to begin the restoration process. backbreaking work included cleaning up the soot and water over and over again, packing up the items that could be salvaged, shifting and disposing damaged furniture, washing the children's chairs, and more.

However, it was tough for the teachers as they were still processing their emotions towards the incident. Teacher Anita initially found it hard to face her classroom that was destroyed after all the hard work was put in.

Thus, she was brought to tears when the first few staff from HQ arrived and started work immediately, cleaning and pushing furniture without hesitation even if it meant getting their clothes or shoes dirty. To top it all off, they did all these with smiles on their faces, constantly asking her and her teachers if they were okay and asking how else they could help.

"In that moment, I remember telling myself I'm in the right organisation. The AMK teachers could not operate as efficiently if the HQ team didn't arrive. I also remember how Ms Shuang and Ms Bea (Principal and Vice-Principal) just humbly being one of us to build the school again," Teacher Anita shared.



As the days went by, we saw how our community who offered help included our beloved parents and guardians.

During that period, there were many changes to daily operations such as having children report at the void deck in the morning and having them be transported by bus to LOT Bukit Arang. Parents and grandparents were not only understanding, but also kind to help out without being asked.

We are so blessed to have our community and family in the good times and bad. Indeed where fire destroys, love restores. It has been a journey of transforming ashes to glory.

They are stronger together.

- How is our family like a tree? (Draw it out together!)
- How can we care for the trees around our house and school?
- How can we care for the community around us? (Come up with a plan to bless someone/a group of people)



Facilitating therapeutic conversations with your child

Why should parents facilitate therapeutic conversations with their children? Because it involves creating a safe and supportive environment for individuals to feel comfortable and express themselves through exploring their thoughts and feelings. This way, parents can get to know their children better, and vice versa.

1. Help your child with emotional regulation



- (a) Self-Regulation: For adult to be aware of own feelings
- (b) Co-regulation: Helping to manage your child's emotions
- (c) Teaching your child to self-regulate

- 2. Strategies for facilitating therapeutic conversations
- (a) Ask questions and listen attentively to what the individual is saying, both verbally and nonverbally
- (b) Reflect their thoughts and feelings to show understanding and validation
- (c) Paraphrase or ask clarifying questions to gain a deeper understanding of their experiences



THE STATE OF THE STATE OF THE

The Unremarkable Work of the ESP

Our Educational Support Programme exists for one reason: for every child who comes through our doors to grow and glow. Despite having the term "Programme" in its name, ESP is more than that. Instead, it is a journey and a commitment to walk with the children with additional needs alongside their families while they are with us in our schools.

When it comes to the realm of early intervention, there are strategies, methods and training. But at the heart of it all, there are no magic formulas, no quick fixes and no guaranteed successes.



Sometimes, life is just what it is and we desire to walk with families in need as long as we have the opportunity and ability to. Hence, we like to refer to our work in early intervention as an "unremarkable work".

Why "Unremarkable"?

Unremarkable means "not particularly interesting or surprising". This might seem to be an odd word selection for the field of early childhood, let alone, special education since we are working with children, especially those with needs.



The Unremarkable Work

Beyond the strategies, methods and techniques, we believe what sets us apart from other education providers is our commitment to journey with children with additional needs. Here are three ways we desire to pursue the unremarkable work:

1. Sitting in the Mud with the Child

We are not interested in journeying with children only if they show promise in progressing. We recognise that every encouraging moment that we observe in the child's life is accompanied by many other ordinary, frustrating, stress-inducing moments that demand patience, love, graciousness and kindness from us.

We accept that this is the reality of life often times – that life can be painful and ugly in spite of our best efforts. While we live for the hope that the child will grow and glow eventually, what the child needs from us most of the time is for us to simply sit in the mud with them through their tantrums and frustrations until one day, they grow.

At Little Olive Tree, we commit to sitting in the mud with the children through the most unremarkable of days. Sometimes, this is the best way we can honour the child and their Maker.



2. Believing that Each Child's Trouble is Worth Troubling For

Meeting parents who are interested in enrolling their child into our Educational Support Programme for the first time is always an emotional experience. By the time our conversation happens, most of these parents have already been turned down by more than one school and are often at their wits' end on how they can help their child.

Raising a child is challenging enough without the additional obstacles that comes with raising a child with additional needs. It is always heart wrenching for us to hear about how their child is termed as the troublemaker that other teachers cannot handle.

The reality is that nurturing children is messy and difficult work. Every child brings along their own sets of trouble. At Little Olive Tree, we believe that as long as we have the capabilities to support them, every child is trouble worth troubling for.

Rallying the Village around the Child and Family

Finally, all progress, no matter how remarkable is pointless if it is not translated across the various contexts the child lives in. Hence, we are not merely interested in observing the improvement in a child's behaviour within the context of the classroom and preschool, as important as this is.

Instead, we want to journey with families, and the village that surrounds the child (be it extended family, the church community or even neighbours) such that that child's progress can be observed across all contexts of life.

At Little Olive Tree, we want to walk with families and the village that will continue to journey with the child long after they have graduated from preschool.

Closing Words

It is much easier to offer a programme that is committed to providing strategies and methods. However, our years of experience in the realm of early intervention work has taught us that true lasting work demands commitment beyond just a "programme". It takes time and effort to journey with others. This is the more challenging and arduous work. This is costlier work.



We hope that as we embark on this endeavour of providing at least 10% of our enrolment capacity for children with additional needs, you will come along to support us. We welcome financial donations of any amount.
